Las Palmas Cathedral

The Cathedral of Santa Ana (*Holy Cathedral-Basilica of Canary or Cathedral of Las Palmas de Gran Canaria*) is a Roman Catholic church located in Las Palmas, Canary Islands.

It is the most important monument of Gran Canaria religious architecture. It was built on the orders of the Queen Isabella I of Castile and King Ferdinand II of Aragon, after Gran Canaria was occupied in 1478.

You can find it in the Vegueta Neighbourhood next to the Great Square of Santa Ana (Plaza Mayor de Santa Ana).

The building started around 1500, it lasted next four centuries to finish it. It was started in the Gothic style, then it continued in the Renaissance style and it was finished in the Neoclassical period.

It consists of three naves of the same height. You can find some important pieces of art in the chapels of the cathedral, for example many statues and paintings.
